



Culpeper's Road to War 1765 – 1775 Driving Tour

An early tour of Culpeper County starting with those Culpeper County leaders, mostly political and voted into the House of Burgesses, who dealt with many of the political crises between 1765–1775 culminating with the formation of the Culpeper Minute Battalion.

- 1 Colonial Courthouse Site (1765 Stamp protest & 1774 Resolves) and Culpeper**
102 E Davis Street
- 2 Baptist Church site, site of the colonial jail, both on East Davis Street.**
176 E Davis Street
- 3 Nathaniel Pendleton – Redwood Plantation – Culpeper Justice who led the 1765 Stamp Protest**
109 Redwood Ln.
- 4 Birkett Davenport – Hilly Farm Plantation – Culpeper's Representative for the 5th Virginia Convention – 1776 House of Delegates**
15008 Chestnut Fork Rd.
- 5 Henry Pendleton – Served in 4 of 5 Revolutionary Conventions and owned Plantation on Hazel River.**
- 6 John Green – Liberty Hall, served as Burgess in 1769, was an important military leader in the Revolution.**
18255 Plantation Loop, Rixeyville
- 7 James Barbour Jr. – Served in the House of Burgesses from Culpeper from his Fleetwood area home.**
19765 Beauregard Rd., Brandy Station
- 8 John Field – (Burgess and Colonel, died at Point Pleasant) homesite area.**
16589 Edwards Shop Rd., Remington
- 9 Henry Field Jr. – Culpeper Burgess who served in 4 of 5 Virginia Conventions.**
20043 Fields Mill Rd., Elkwood
- 10 French Strother – Served in 5th Virginia Convention. Strother lived at Ashland Plantation.**
18161 Ashland Farm Rd. (NOT LISTED ON THE GOOGLE MAP, BUT IS ON THE WAY TO THE LAST STOP)
- 11 Yowell Meadow Park – Muster site of Culpeper Minutemen 1775 on Major Philip Clayton's Old Field.**
